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Southern Arizona Children's Advocacy Center

The mission of the Children's Advocacy Center is "to protect and support children through a coordinated response to child maltreatment that includes intervention, assessment, and prevention." The Center works in a joint-investigation process with local law enforcement agencies and Child Protective Services to provide an array of investigative and advocacy services to child victims of abuse. Expert medical evaluations, videotaped forensic interviews, crisis intervention, and case coordination are all provided in one, child-sensitive place. Children come to the Center from throughout Tucson and Pima County, as well as from other cities and counties in southern Arizona. Each year, more than 1200 child victims of abuse receive services at the Children's Advocacy Center.

The Board of Directors is comprised of representatives from the agency's law enforcement partners and community citizens from education, mental and medical health, accounting and business. The board is seeking new members from the faith-based community, from geographical areas outside the city of Tucson, and from private and charter schools. Potential board members who have expertise in public relations, fundraising, and local or state government are also needed.

AHC Work:

AHC supports public programming in the humanities that promotes understanding of human thoughts, actions, creations, and values.
